"Spotlight" on...Eva Mac Niven

I'm not one much for change as you will see after reading this. I was born and raised in St. Paul. We moved out to this end of town when I was 1½ years old and I have always lived in this general area. I went to Homecroft Elementary school and graduated from Monroe High School. I was baptized along with my sister Audrey at home by Pastor Walter Pilgrim when I was 7½ years old and have never belonged to any congregation but St. Luke. Boring, you say? I say it's nice and comfortable...just the way I like it!

Several years after confirmation, I began to teach Sunday School. I did this for quite a time and then moved up to the job of Superintendent of the Sunday School for a number of years. During this time I sang in the choir and only recently quit when I realized my 81 year old voice could no longer be relied upon to hit the real high or very low notes of a soprano's range. I played in the Bell Choir since it's beginning until recently when I realized I was missing notes every so often even though it may not have been glaringly noticeable.

Seems as if I have been on the Church Council forever and I was treasurer of the congregation for more years than I can count. I quit when I realized the old fashioned idea of receipts and disbursements (which are the terms I still think in) are no longer the jargon that the younger generation now uses.

After I retired from Early American Life Insurance Co. in 1988 I started to participate in the Loaves and Fishes ministry which was called Food For Friends back then. I also help with the Southwest Area Meals (Meals on Wheels) program since retiring.

I think my favorite hymn is "Lord, Whose Love in Humble Service": #712 in the new hymnal. When Linda Jundt was our organist she used to play this hymn as the offertory so when it was assigned as a hymn the congregation was to sing we were all familiar with the tune.

Some people say that St. Luke may fall apart when pastor Jack retires. I surely hope not as you are all the bulk of my family and when I leave this earth, I want my funeral service to be held at St. Luke Lutheran Church.
